The program presented by Doug Stout will include a first person portrayal of Patrick Henry Taylor and will discuss the 1st Minnesota's involvement at the Battle of Gettysburg through the eyes of PH Taylor and his brother Issac Taylor. Stout will use their personal diaries and letters to tell the story of the brother's before, during and after this pivotal battle of the Civil War.

Doug has worked for the Licking County Library for 23 years. He inherited his passion for the Civil War from his parents who made history come alive during summer vacation tours of battlefields.

He does not remember a time that he didn't know the names Lee, Grant or Gettysburg.

150 Years Ago

April 2 - Bread riot breaks out in Richmond, Virginia.

April 16 - Admiral Porter's ships successfully steam south past the Confederate batteries at Vicksburg, Mississippi.

April 21 - Colonel Abel D. Streight, his Union cavalry riding mules, launches a raid into Alabama and Georgia.

General William E. Jones takes his Confederate cavalry into western Virginia. Jones coordinates his maneuvers with Imboden to disrupt the Baltimore & Ohio Railroad.

April 28 - The federal War Department establishes the Invalid Corps, later renamed the Veteran Reserve Corps.

Hooker's Army of the Potomac crosser the Rappahannock River in an attempt to circle behind Lee's Army of Northern Virginia.
